Dental care costs are one of the most significant — and most avoidable — barriers preventing Frankston-area families from maintaining their oral health. The data backs this up: around 3 in 10 (32%) people aged 18 and over avoided or delayed dental care due to cost, according to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW). More recently, the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) confirmed that 25% of people delayed or skipped seeing a dental professional when needed, with 16% citing cost as the reason in 2024–25.

For families in Carrum Downs, Frankston, Langwarrin, Seaford, and the broader Mornington Peninsula, the financial side of dentistry isn't an abstract policy question. It's a lived reality that shapes whether children get their first check-up on time, whether a painful tooth gets treated before it becomes an abscess, and whether preventive care happens at all. This guide breaks down what dental treatment actually costs in this region, which government-funded schemes you may already qualify for, how to use private health insurance effectively, and what interest-free payment options exist — so cost never has to be the reason your family misses out on care.

Why dental costs feel disproportionately high in Australia

Unlike visits to a GP, dental care sits largely outside Australia's universal Medicare system. That structural gap has real financial consequences. Individuals directly fund 61% of total dental expenditure — as of 2022–23, according to the AIHW — and that burden falls hardest on lower-income households. More than a quarter (27%) of Australians in areas of most socio-economic disadvantage delayed or skipped dental care due to cost, compared with 11% in the least disadvantaged areas, according to the ABS.

Research published in 2025 reinforces this: more than half of Australian adults report difficulty paying a \$200 AUD dental bill, and 44% say they've avoided or delayed treatment because of cost (Hopcraft & Singh, *Journal of Dental Research*, 2025). Although dental treatment costs haven't outpaced median wage growth over the past nine years, for people earning below median income, routine dental care still takes a meaningful bite out of disposable income.

The good news for families in Carrum Downs and the Frankston City area: a layered set of government-funded schemes, private insurance rebates, and clinic-level payment plans can dramatically reduce — or in some cases eliminate — out-of-pocket costs. Knowing how to access them is the key, and that's exactly what this guide is for.

What typical dental treatments actually cost in 2025

Understanding the fee landscape is the first step to managing it. Australian dental practices set their own fees, but the Australian Dental Association (ADA) publishes benchmark data through its biennial Dental Fees Survey.

The latest survey puts the national average for a routine check-up at \$233 AUD, covering a periodic oral exam, scale and clean, and fluoride treatment. There's meaningful variation within that figure, though: ADA data from 2022 shows the average for item numbers 012, 114, and 121 (examination, scale and clean, fluoride) sits around \$219 AUD, with the cheapest recorded at \$162 AUD and the most expensive at \$309 AUD.

The table below summarises typical fee ranges for common treatments across Australian private practices, drawn from ADA survey data and current clinic disclosures:

Root canal costs vary depending on the tooth's location and complexity, generally landing between \$1,000 AUD and \$2,500 AUD. Crown costs typically range from \$1,200 AUD to \$2,500 AUD depending on the material.

One practical point for Frankston-area families: a suburban Carrum Downs clinic like Core Dental Group, with lower overhead than a Melbourne CBD practice, will typically sit at the lower-to-mid range of these benchmarks. Geography itself is a cost advantage.

Government-funded schemes: what you may already qualify for

The Child Dental Benefit Schedule (CDBS): Medicare bulk billing for children

The most powerful cost-reduction tool available to eligible Frankston-area families is the Child Dental Benefit Schedule (CDBS), a Medicare-supported program administered by Services Australia.

The CDBS covers a range of services — exams, X-rays, fillings, root canals, extractions, scale and clean, fluoride, and fissure sealants — for children aged 0–17 whose parents receive Family Tax Benefit Part A or a relevant Australian Government payment. Orthodontic and cosmetic procedures are excluded, as are any services provided in a hospital.

****Current benefit caps (indexed annually on 1 January):****

- Up to \$1,132 AUD per eligible child if 2025 is year one of the two-calendar-year period - Up to \$1,158 AUD per eligible child if 2026 is year one of the two-calendar-year period - The full amount can be used in the first calendar year if needed

****How to check eligibility and claim:****

1. Log in to your Medicare online account via myGov, or call Medicare on 132 011.
2. You don't need to apply — eligibility notifications are sent automatically by post or through myGov.
3. When booking with Core Dental Group, let the clinic know you want to use CDBS.
4. Dentists registered with the Dental

Board of Australia and holding a Medicare provider number can provide services under the CDBS, but the child's eligibility and remaining allocation must be confirmed before treatment begins. 5. At most participating clinics, CDBS treatment is bulk billed.

For a family with two eligible children, the CDBS represents up to \$2,316 AUD in fully bulk-billed dental care over two years — enough to cover multiple check-ups, cleans, and a filling or two per child with zero out-of-pocket cost. Victorian government dental voucher schemes

For adults holding a Health Care Card, Pensioner Concession Card, or receiving relevant Centrelink payments, Victoria operates three publicly funded dental schemes that can be accessed through private clinics like Core Dental Group when public waiting lists are long.

These schemes are administered by Dental Health Services Victoria (DHSV):

1. Victorian General Dental Scheme (VGDS)

The VGDS enables eligible patients to receive dental treatment from private providers when public dental clinics have extended wait times. Patients are issued a voucher — typically valued up to \$939 AUD — which covers a wide range of treatments at public clinic rates. Each voucher is valid for three months and includes a co-payment of \$31.50 AUD per visit, capped at \$126 AUD for a full course of care.

2. Victorian Emergency Dental Scheme (VEDS)

The VEDS covers urgent dental care, including pain relief, extractions, and trauma treatment. Eligible individuals — Health Care Card holders and pensioners — can receive a voucher through public dental clinics to help cover significant treatment costs during emergencies.

3. Victorian Denture Scheme (VDS)

The VDS covers denture-related services for low-income individuals, including new dentures and the repair or relining of existing ones.

How to access Victorian vouchers:

Vouchers can be issued to patients experiencing a dental emergency or sitting on a public general waiting list, particularly when community dental agencies cannot provide in-house care or when extra funding is available. Contact your nearest community dental clinic or call Dental Health Services Victoria to get started. General vouchers are valid for three months from the date of issue. Ask Core Dental Group whether they are a registered VGDS or VEDS provider before attending.

Using private health insurance effectively

For families with extras (ancillary) cover, private health insurance is the main way to reduce out-of-pocket dental costs at private clinics — but using it strategically means understanding how rebates, benefit limits, and waiting periods actually work.

How dental extras cover works

Most extras policies divide dental into three tiers:

- ****General/preventive dental:**** Check-ups, X-rays, scale and clean, fluoride, fissure sealants. Often covered at 60–100% of the ADA schedule fee, up to an annual limit (typically \$200–\$500 AUD per

person). - **Major dental:** Crowns, bridges, dentures, root canals. Covered at lower rates (50–80%), with higher annual limits and typically a 12-month waiting period. - **Orthodontics:** Braces and aligners. Usually covered under a separate lifetime limit (often \$1,500–\$3,500 AUD) with a waiting period of 12–24 months.

Practical tips to maximise your rebate

1. **Use HICAPS at the chair.** Core Dental Group and most Carrum Downs clinics have HICAPS terminals that process your health fund rebate instantly, so you only pay the gap on the day. 2. **Know your annual limit reset date.** Most funds reset on 1 January. If you have unused benefit, schedule your second check-up before 31 December. 3. **Compare the ADA schedule fee to your fund's benefit.** Some funds pay a percentage of the ADA schedule fee, not the clinic's actual fee. If your clinic charges above the schedule, your gap increases. 4. **Ask for a written fee estimate with item numbers.** Every dental service has an ADA item number. Request a written treatment plan with item numbers before treatment, then call your health fund to confirm your exact rebate before committing. 5. **Consider switching funds annually.** The extras market is competitive. Switching to a fund with a higher general dental limit — especially if you have children — can save hundreds per year.

Most extras policies cover two dental visits per year for preventive care, meaning a family with good extras cover can effectively receive two check-ups and cleans per person at zero cost — one of the most valuable preventive investments available.

Interest-free payment plans and flexible financing

For restorative or specialist treatments where costs run into the thousands — implants, crowns, orthodontics — many Carrum Downs clinics offer in-house or third-party financing options that spread the cost without interest charges. Core Dental Group encourages patients to discuss these options before committing to any treatment plan.

What to ask your Carrum Downs clinic: - "Do you offer interest-free payment plans, and what is the minimum deposit?" - "Do you accept DentiCare or Humm?" - "Can I split my treatment across two calendar years to use two annual health fund limits?"

That last question is worth asking for any large treatment plan. Having a crown preparation done in December and the crown fitted in January, for example, lets you claim against two separate annual benefit periods — effectively doubling your health fund contribution to that treatment.

Comparing out-of-pocket costs: a practical scenario

To show how these mechanisms work together, consider a typical Frankston-area family of four — two adults and two children aged 8 and 11 — attending Core Dental Group in Carrum Downs for a year of routine dental care.

Scenario: family of four, with basic extras cover, CDBS-eligible children

A family using available entitlements correctly can reduce a \$1,080 AUD annual dental bill to approximately \$150 AUD — an 86% reduction. Without these mechanisms, the same family pays the full amount.

The hidden cost of avoiding the dentist

The financial case for preventive care is straightforward. A \$219 AUD check-up that catches a small cavity costs \$180–\$250 AUD to fix. Left untreated, that same cavity can progress to pulp infection requiring root canal treatment (\$1,000–\$2,500 AUD) and ultimately a crown (\$1,200–\$2,500 AUD). Deferring a single check-up appointment can generate a \$3,000–\$5,000 AUD treatment cascade — the opposite of saving money.

In 2022–23, over 87,000 hospitalisations for dental conditions could have been avoided if patients had been treated earlier, according to the AIHW. That figure represents real people, real pain, and real costs that routine preventive care would have prevented.

Step-by-step: how to minimise your dental costs at a Carrum Downs clinic

1. ****Check CDBS eligibility first.**** Log into myGov or call Medicare (132 011) before your child's appointment. If eligible, confirm the clinic bulk bills under CDBS.
2. ****Review your extras cover.**** Call your health fund and ask: "What is my remaining general dental benefit for this year, and what is my rebate for item numbers 012, 114, and 121?"
3. ****Ask for a written fee estimate with item numbers.**** Before any treatment beyond a check-up, request a written treatment plan with ADA item numbers and estimated fees.
4. ****Ask about Victorian voucher schemes.**** If you hold a Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card, ask Core Dental Group whether they accept VGDS or VEDS vouchers.
5. ****Explore payment plans for major work.**** For crowns, implants, or orthodontics, ask about DentiCare, Humm, or in-house plans before committing.
6. ****Time your treatments strategically.**** Split large treatments across the 1 January calendar boundary to access two annual health fund benefit periods.
7. ****Attend twice yearly.**** Two preventive visits per year, fully or largely covered by extras, prevents the costly treatment cascade that comes from deferred care.

The Child Dental Benefit Schedule, Victorian government voucher schemes, private health extras cover, and clinic-level payment plans together form a financial safety net capable of covering the vast majority of routine and even some restorative dental needs for eligible families.
