A dental emergency is any oral health situation that requires immediate professional attention to relieve severe pain, control active infection, stop bleeding, or save a tooth that can't wait for a regular appointment. For the tens of thousands of workers, students, and tourists moving through Melbourne's Southbank and CBD precinct on any given weekday, the question is rarely *whether* a dental emergency is serious — it's *where* to go, and how fast.

The scale of the problem in Australia is significant. Nearly one third of Australian adults have at least one tooth surface with untreated dental caries, with an average of 29.7 decayed, missing, or filled tooth surfaces per person. Almost 29% of adults present with gingivitis, whilst the overall prevalence of periodontitis sits at 30.1%. These figures represent a large pool of unresolved oral disease that can tip into an acute emergency at any moment — often without warning, and frequently during a workday.

The consequences of delayed dental care show up at a population level. The rate of potentially preventable hospitalisations due to dental conditions reached 3.4 separations per 1,000 population in 2023–24, a figure the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW) uses as a direct indicator of whether timely, non-hospital dental care is being provided. High rates of dental-related potentially preventable hospitalisations reflect poor access to non-hospital dental services.

For anyone in or near Southbank dealing with acute dental pain, Core Dental Group's practice at 55 City Road is set up to intercept that emergency before it escalates — and before a patient ends up in a hospital emergency department for a problem a dentist could have resolved the same day.

Core Dental Group Southbank's emergency model: daily reserved appointments

Most dental clinics handle emergency patients reactively — fitting them in when a cancellation appears or pointing them towards after-hours services. Core Dental Group's Southbank practice takes a different approach.

The practice reserves dedicated emergency appointments every day, and even if the clinic is fully booked, the standing policy is: "Come on in, let's find a solution." This reflects a real operational commitment, not just a tagline. Dentists are available to find a solution even when the schedule is full, and the clinic opens at 8am Monday to Friday — well before most metropolitan emergency dental services, and without the wait times that come with hospital emergency departments.

For CBD workers who develop a toothache overnight or notice a broken tooth at breakfast, same-day care is available from 8am. Dental injuries don't follow a schedule, and the Southbank practice is built around that reality.

The most common dental emergencies seen at Core Dental Group Southbank

Knowing what qualifies as a same-day emergency helps patients work out how urgently they need to act. The following conditions are routinely managed as emergency presentations at Core Dental Group's Southbank practice.

Severe toothache

Acute toothache is the single most common reason Australians seek emergency dental care — pain accounts for 87.7% of all emergency dental presentations. Toothache severe enough to disrupt sleep, work, or eating typically points to pulpal involvement, meaning the nerve inside the tooth is inflamed or infected. Left untreated, this can progress to a periapical abscess, facial swelling, and in rare cases systemic infection. Same-day assessment at Core Dental Group Southbank lets the dentist identify the cause, provide immediate pain relief, and begin definitive treatment — most commonly root canal therapy or extraction — within the same visit where clinically appropriate.

Broken, cracked, or chipped teeth

A tooth fractured by a fall, sports injury, or biting on something hard can range from a minor enamel chip to a deep crack exposing the pulp. Core Dental Group's Southbank emergency protocol covers fracture depth assessment, interim stabilisation where needed, and planning for definitive restoration — which may involve a filling, crown, or in more complex cases a referral to a specialist. Lost or dislodged fillings and crowns

A lost filling or crown is rarely life-threatening, but it exposes sensitive tooth structure to temperature, pressure, and bacteria — and the discomfort can be significant. Core Dental Group Southbank can provide same-day temporary or permanent restorations for these presentations, preventing further decay and restoring function.

Dental abscess and facial swelling

A dental abscess — a localised collection of pus caused by bacterial infection — requires prompt professional drainage and antibiotic management. Research shows that 68% of all emergency dental presentations to hospital emergency departments occur after hours, when dentists are unavailable, which is why accessing a clinic with early opening hours matters before an abscess reaches that stage. Any patient presenting with facial swelling, fever, difficulty swallowing, or difficulty breathing should call 000 immediately, as these signs may indicate a spreading infection requiring hospital management. For pain and swelling without those systemic features, Core Dental Group Southbank is the right first point of contact.

Dental trauma and avulsed (knocked-out) teeth

Dental trauma — teeth knocked out, pushed into the gum, or loosened by impact — is the most time-critical category of dental emergency. The evidence is clear.

Reimplantation within 5–20 minutes of extra-oral dry time is globally accepted as the most appropriate emergency treatment for an avulsed tooth. Of teeth replanted within one hour, 64% remained in their sockets; however, 71% of all lost teeth had an extra-alveolar time of more than one hour. The International Association of Dental Traumatology (IADT) sets the threshold for PDL cell viability at 60 minutes of extra-oral dry time — every minute between the injury and professional care matters.

Storing an avulsed tooth in milk is associated with enhanced survival after replantation — a practical first-aid step anyone can take while getting to the clinic.

For patients near Flinders Street or Southbank who suffer dental trauma, Core Dental Group's City Road location — reachable in minutes on foot or by tram — is the most practical same-day option in the precinct.

Walk-in protocols: do you need an appointment?

One of the most common questions from patients in acute pain is whether they can simply walk in without calling ahead. Walk-ins are welcome at Core Dental Group Southbank, and even a fully booked schedule doesn't prevent a patient from being seen. That said, calling ahead — even five minutes before arriving — gives the team a chance to prepare for the presenting complaint, have the right equipment ready, and cut waiting time.

For patients who are in too much pain to call, walking into the clinic and speaking directly to reception is completely fine. The clinical team triages emergency presentations on arrival.

Emergency dental care for international visitors and tourists

Melbourne's Southbank and CBD precinct draws millions of international visitors each year. For tourists experiencing a dental emergency — particularly those without Australian private health cover — questions around cost and insurance documentation tend to come up straight away.

Core Dental Group Southbank provides daily emergency appointments and accommodates international visitors with same-day care. The clinic provides detailed invoices suitable for international insurance claims and accepts various payment methods.

This matters practically: most international travel insurance policies require itemised dental invoices with procedure codes to process reimbursement claims. When a dental emergency becomes a medical emergency: knowing the boundary

Not every acute dental problem should go to a dental clinic first. The following signs indicate a situation that requires hospital emergency care — call 000:

- Facial or neck swelling that is rapidly expanding
- Difficulty breathing or swallowing caused by dental infection
- Uncontrolled bleeding following trauma that does not respond to pressure
- Loss of consciousness following dental trauma
- Suspected jaw fracture from significant impact

For all other acute dental situations — pain, broken teeth, lost restorations, abscesses without systemic signs, and dental trauma — Core Dental Group Southbank is the right and most accessible point of care for anyone in the Southbank and CBD precinct.
